## SB 1383 Timeline of Requirements

Year	Requirements	Actions you need to take
January 1, 2022	Regulations take effect and enforcement begins	Establish edible food recovery programs, capacity planning, conduct outreach and education
February 1, 2022	Education and Outreach	Conduct education and outreach to tier 1 and tier 2 commercial edible food generators
January 1, 2024	Local governments takeover enforcement	Local governments take action against non-compliant entities
January 1, 2025	75% reduction in organic waste disposal, and 20% increase in edible food recovery	Must be compliant with all SB 1383 requirements or face fines and penalties

# SB1383 Compliance:

1

Conduct a capacity assessment and identify Tier 1 and Tier 2 edible food generators. Develop a list of food recovery organizations and services.

2

Expand edible food recovery capacity if it is determined that sufficient capacity does not exist.

3

Provide education and outreach to Tier 1 and Tier 2 commercial edible food generators.

# SB1383 Compliance:

4

Increase commercial food generator access to food recovery organizations and services.

5

Develop list of edible food generators that have a written agreement with food recovery organizations or services.

6

Monitor compliance and conduct enforcement.

# Approach:

## Generator Outreach

**Abound will begin outreaching to Tier 1 and 2 generators to:**

- Confirm the Tier 1 and Tier 2 eligibility
- Identify if a generator demonstrates “extraordinary circumstances” beyond its control, making compliance impracticable
- Identify which generators have a current relationship with a food recovery agency and if that relationship has a contract or written agreement for food recovery
  - Identify any notes or limitations/anomalies within the contract, if applicable
- Identify if generators can expand current food donations
- Quantify the amount of edible food (in pounds) that will be disposed by commercial edible food generators.

## Abound will outreach to Food Recovery Organizations and Services:


- Generate a list of food recovery organizations
- Confirm if a written contract/agreement exists between the food recovery agency and any Tier 1 and/or Tier 2 generator
- Identify existing capacity at food recovery organizations available to commercial generators
- List plans for new, or expanded, capacity, if any, at food recovery organizations and food recovery
- Identify potential opportunities to bridge and leverage existing relationships
